

Early Childhood Education Teachers' Strategies for Reducing Aggressive Behavior

This study examines how preschool teachers address aggressive behavior in young students. Aggressive behavior, including physical and verbal actions, can be a precursor to bullying. The research aims to describe strategies implemented by teachers to reduce aggression in early childhood settings. Using a qualitative approach with descriptive methods, the study involves interviews and observations of PAUD (early childhood education) teachers.





Understanding Aggressive Behavior in Early Childhood

Aggressive behavior in early childhood often stems from a child's inability to manage emotions, communicate effectively, or resolve conflicts peacefully. It can manifest as physical actions like hitting or kicking, or verbal aggression such as shouting. Environmental factors, lack of supervision, and exposure to violent media can contribute to aggressive tendencies. While some aggression is considered part of normal development, if left unmanaged it can evolve into more serious behavioral issues.

Teacher Perceptions and Understanding

Teachers view aggressive behavior negatively, recognizing its potential impact on child development. They understand aggressive behavior as intentional acts to harm others, either physically or non-physically. Teachers identify common aggressive behaviors such as kicking, hitting, and using harsh words. They recognize that aggressive behavior can significantly affect a child's emotional well-being, potentially leading to decreased self-confidence and anxiety in social situations.

- 1 Negative View
 - Teachers perceive aggressive behavior as detrimental to child development

 Understood as deliberate acts to hurt others physically or emotionally
- Common Behaviors
 Identified as kicking, hitting, and using harsh language
- 4 Emotional Impact

 Recognized effects include decreased self-confidence and social anxiety





Intervention Strategies

Teachers employ various strategies to address aggressive behavior. These include giving immediate reprimands, taking firm and consistent action, providing positive reinforcement, and implementing punishments when necessary. They also involve parents and provide guidance for children. Specific interventions include quickly stopping fights, implementing classroom consequences like time-outs, informing parents, teaching kindness and empathy, and supporting victims. Teachers emphasize the importance of supervising children's behavior and participating in their play activities.

Specific Intervention Steps

Teachers follow a structured approach to intervention: 1) Reprimanding the aggressor by questioning the cause and effect of their behavior, encouraging self-reflection. 2) Responding quickly when fights occur to immediately stop negative behavior. 3) Maintaining a firm attitude towards aggressors to uphold rules and create discipline. 4) Implementing a reward and punishment system, where good behavior is rewarded and aggressive behavior faces consequences.



Question Behavior

Ask about causes and effects of aggressive actions



Quick Response

Immediately intervene when conflicts arise



Firm Attitude

Maintain consistent discipline and rule enforcement



Rewards/Consequences

Implement system of rewards for good behavior and consequences for aggression

Theoretical Basis for Interventions

The intervention steps used by teachers are supported by research showing their effectiveness in reducing aggression and creating a positive environment. Reprimanding aggressors helps children evaluate the consequences of their actions, building self-awareness. Immediate responses to conflicts send a clear message that aggressive behavior is unacceptable. Firm attitudes towards aggressors help establish boundaries and discipline. The reward and punishment system encourages positive behavior while discouraging negative actions, helping children consider the impact of their behavior.
